

And while they went to buy it, the bridegroom came, and those who were ready went with him into the wedding banquet; and the door was shut. Later the other bridesmaids came also, saying, 'Lord, lord, open to us.' But he replied, 'Truly I tell you, I do not know you.' Keep awake therefore, for you know neither the day nor the hour."

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#### The Sermon

The Reverend Dr. W. Lee Domenick

"Wisdom is radiant and unfading, and she is easily discerned by those who love her, and is found by those who seek her." I do not know about you, but this has been one of those weeks. I think you could cut the tension with a knife. I find myself running the gambit of emotions. From the bastions of joy to the depths of sadness. From the heights of hope to the walls of doubt. Simply put, this week for me has been hell. I know it seems a bit overdramatic and extreme, but I am being vulnerable and letting you know where I am, and maybe, just maybe, you are here with me.

Many of us have probably had this experience; we were leaving to get home and are in a hurry, but notice that the gas tank is running low. We do a quick calculation and figure we have enough to get home, so head for the highway, only to round the corner, go up the ramp, to get stuck in bumper-to-bumper traffic that is moving slower than we can walk! Anxiously, we watch the gas gauge. Maybe we have a car with a warning light when the gas in the tank gets too low. We fidget, probably chastise ourselves, and even perhaps share a few choice words with God that need not be repeated here, for not thinking ahead, taking the time, and getting the gas. We tend to have a short vision of preparedness when we are in a hurry or convinced that the drive or wait will not be long, and we can make it. And then a week, like this week, comes stomping up to us. This Sunday's Gospel challenges us to look with long vision and become aware that every detail of what we were doing now is part of life's journey toward meeting our Bridegroom.

In the gospel parable, there is no doubt that the Bridegroom will come. What is unexpected is his long delay, which reveals the wisdom of those virgins who were prepared. The seeming harsh nature of the five wise virgins' response to the foolish virgins' request to share their oil does not point to wrong relationships among the ten virgins, but it points to the right relationship the five wise virgins had with the Bridegroom.

The long delay of the Bridegroom's coming reveals both the wisdom and long vision of the five virgins prepared and the loss of those who were short-sighted and unprepared – the "door was locked," and they were not admitted to the wedding feast.

For us, the delay is not a time for sleeping but a crucial time that requires the wisdom to know both that Christ will do his part in seeking us and that we must do our part in seeking God with hope and urgency. This is a two-way relationship – seeking and being sought – keeps us prepared and unafraid of what is to come.

These last Sundays of the year of Matthew focus on the Parousia, a big word for the Lord's return at the end of times; considering the "end" of time and the inevitability of our mortality, our first thoughts may be of work never to be completed and dreams never to be realized. Instead of terrifying us or intimidating us or driving us to despair, the inevitable return of Christ "the bridegroom" should make us realize the preciousness of the time we have been given and inspire us to make the most of this time, filling our "lamps" with the "oil" of compassion, justice, forgiveness, and gratefulness, as we await Christs' coming.

I know this entire election cycle has been challenging for me, for many, if not all, of us. The back and forth, the media blitz, the comments from friends, family, and those we know nothing about, can be daunting and tough to hear, to read, and live in and with. No matter which side of the political spectrum you are on, which side you chose, I want to ask us to seek. "Wisdom that is radiant and unfading, and she is easily discerned by those who love her, and is found by those who seek her." There is so much more that connects us than divides us. I do not deny the world as it is, but I am saying that we can choose the radiant and unfading wisdom. We can choose to be prepared and continue this journey together.

Let me see if I can put this a little differently. Time is like a circus that keeps packing up and moving on. Time is a gift that God gives us through which we might come to discover Christ and the things that are of God. Our days' of busyness can derail us from embracing the essential things of life itself – like the love of family and friends. The wisdom of God compels us to seek Christ, the Bridegroom, in every moment we have been given in this life until the wedding feast of the life to come. Amen.

#### The Nicene Creed

We believe in one God, the Father, the Almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all that is, seen and unseen. We believe in one Lord, Jesus Christ, the only Son of God, eternally begotten of the Father, God from God, Light from Light, true God from true God, begotten, not made, of one Being with the Father. We acknowledge one baptism for the forgiveness of sins. We look for the resurrection of the dead. and the life of the world to come. Amen.


